
FIGURE 1.1: TYPICAL DRUM CHART

PIGURE 4.5: BEALED EIGHTH NOTES (ENDING OFF THE BEAT)




Example 1 shows the snare drum playing the figure while time continues on the ride.

Example 2 shows a ruff preceding the accented note.

Example 3 shows a roll leading into the accented note.

Figure 10.9 shows one figure written in three different contexts.

Example 1 shows the ride cymbal being choked to observe the rests in front of the figure.

Example 2 shows how a fill may be used to set up the figure.

Example 3 shows the figure preceded by time on the ride cymbal.

Many times the composer gives the drummer an indication of certain figures to be played by other members of the band. These are cues and are always written above the staff. Play these cues with slightly less emphasis than an ensemble figure written within the staff. Continue playing time, and try to incorporate the cues into the time feel. Always use the appropriate taste
